October Board Meeting Summary



At its October Meeting, your board took the following actions:

- Accepted the Sept. minutes and the Treasurer's Report.
- Voted to submit an application to form a 501(c)3 corporation under the LWVC umbrella and to request a report on next steps.

The board also learned that:

- The **LWVC State Convention** will be held in San Jose on May 17-19. They will be looking for volunteers from local Leagues to help out.
- **Voter Service Forums** are in full swing. Two City Council Candidates Forums, a State Assembly and Senate Candidates Forum and a School Board Forum are scheduled in the next three weeks.
- **Voter registration** was very successful at the Veterans Administration Hospital on September 24, 25 and 27. Voter registration is planned for Menlo Park,

Stevenson House, and Gunn and Palo Alto High Schools in the next few weeks.

- 11 speakers have volunteered for 17 **Pros and Cons** engagements with a possible additional one at Stevenson House. 2250 Voters Guides have been mailed or will be distributed at Voter Service events or voter registration.
- The LWVPA positions on selected propositions will be published in the three local papers in October.
- The **office move** was successful, including painting, address and phone number changes and relocating files and furniture.
- The **Winter Luncheon** will take place at the Garden Court Hotel on December 11 from 11:30 am to 1:30 pm. Dr. Christina Swanson will speak.

Initiative and Referendum Process Update Study Underway



To all Palo Alto Leaguers who are saying, "There must be a better way to do ballot initiatives!"

Our League will be organizing a **study committee to update LWVC's current positions on ballot initiatives and referendums**. The goal: To see what changes, if any, we need to make to our consensus of 1999.

This November's election points out some weaknesses in our present positions. For example, we have no way of removing Proposition 40 from the 2012 ballot even though those who originally proposed it are no longer backing it. When the courts denied their request to have Special Masters redraw the State Senate newly created districts in time for the November election, they withdrew their support for it. However, once a measure qualifies for the ballot, it is set in stone.

Another example: Proposition 31 lists nine disparate governmental reforms, from creating a two-year state budget cycle to requiring publication of all bills and

amendments at least three days prior to a legislative vote. Voters are expected to weigh in with a simple "yes" or "no" on this complex proposal. Does this proposition meet the single subject requirement? Should it have to?

When the dust settles, please consider joining us in what should be an interesting review of current practices and your suggestions for changes.

The first meeting will be on Tuesday, November 13, 3-5 pm, at the Moldaw Residences, 899 E. Charleston Road, in the second-floor Mountain View Room.

Please use the circular drive entrance off Charleston Road. A valet will park your car. This is a free service and valets are not allowed to accept tips. Enter the lobby and tell the concierge that you are here for the League meeting.

Our Winter Luncheon Speaker - Dr. Christina Swanson

We are really pleased to have Dr. Christina Swanson as the speaker at our Annual Winter Luncheon on December 11 to talk to us about **Water: Where Does It Come From, Where Is It Going?** California water and the Delta is the focus of Bay Area League Day on February 2, 2013.

Dr. Swanson was appointed **Director of the Science Center of the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC) in 2011**. She oversees the implementation of the Science Center's dual mission of expanding NRDC'S scientific capabilities and increasing the visibility of advocacy efforts to address today's most pressing environmental challenges. These include reducing global warming pollution and protecting endangered species.

Dr. Swanson, who earned a Ph.D. in Biology from UCLA, is nationally renowned for her leadership on environmental, biological, water quality and water resource management issues.

After Dr. Swanson completed a bachelor's degree in biology at Cornell University, she taught marine biology and maritime history at a southern California educational non-profit. Her doctoral research with UCLA took her to Hawaii and to the Philippines as a Fulbright Fellow. Post-doctoral work at UC Davis brought her back home to the San Francisco Bay Area and new work on water and the fishes of California's largest watershed and estuary, the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta. She has worked closely with NRDC staff on national, state, and local species protection and water issues for many years.

Please join us on December 11 at our Winter Luncheon in the Garden Court Hotel to hear Dr. Swanson's timely and interesting talk.

Remembering Sally....

Sally Probst was LWVPA president in 1999-2000, in 1994-96 and co-president with Irene Sampson in 1996-97. She was on too many housing and transportation committees in the State, Bay Area, County and LWVPA Leagues, as well as the community at large, to list here. She was particularly proud of her appointment to the VTA's Citizens Advisory Committee representing seniors. Before she came to Palo Alto, she was active in the Leagues of Dayton, Ohio, and Cook County, Illinois, and was the first woman ever elected to serve as trustee (council member) of the Village of Northbrook, Illinois.

Some members share their memories of Sally:

She was a role model and shining light. Even as her health deteriorated, she was always positive. I especially liked her ability to zero in on the crux of the matter without a lot of histrionics and long speeches. Very down to earth--my impression from the first time I met her, probably 15 or so years ago. -- *Mary Jo Levy*

May she inspire us as she always has, as we go forward remembering what a model Leaguer she was for us. -- *Mary Alice Thornton*

Sally was "always there" for us. She recruited me to chair our LWVPA State and County Leagues' study on Juvenile Justice. From her, I learned of her long-time dedication to Juvenile Justice going back to Cook County days. She gave her board a lot of freedom to innovate while still giving wise counsel on our activities. Along with her untiring work for housing and other community issues, she was fun to be with, told jokes with a twinkle in her eye and a good friend, too. -- *Veronica Tincher*

Sally was a good friend and an excellent Leaguer. She participated in the Great Decisions group when her health allowed and her insight added much to our discussions. -- *Nancy Olson*

She was co-president with Irene Sampson when I joined the League. At my first meeting, Program Planning, I asked Sally what I could do. Without a pause she had me assigned as the membership database keeper--known as the dues secretary then. She was a great mentor and had a real knack for growing membership. -- *Doris Petersen*

I think what I admired most about Sally is that she knew her own mind and spoke it clearly and fearlessly, yet (almost) always with respect for those she knew would disagree with her. And she never gave up, on her causes or her life. -- *Ellen Smith*

Advocacy Report

The League of Women Voters advocates on legislative issues and takes positions on ballot propositions and measures only when we have studied an issue and come to a consensus on the general principles. The League board at the appropriate level evaluates the issue, proposition or measure based on those agreed upon principles. Once a position has been taken, we may lobby in favor of or against an issue. Urgency, time, financial resources, and our ability to be effective come to bear when choosing which issues will have high priority. Even our voter advocacy work is based on our positions. Below is a sampling of work done with this election season. (Note that most of LWV work involves study, education, and neutral voter service work in which we do not take a position. We never support or oppose a party or a candidate.)

LWVPA placed ads in the Palo Alto Weekly, the Daily News, and the Daily Post stating the LWVC positions on the California ballot measures.

LWVC supports Proposition 30, Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act, **Proposition 34**, Safe California, and **Proposition 40**, Referendum on Redistricting. It **opposes Proposition 31**, the Government Performance and Accountability Act and **Proposition 32**, the Special Exemption Act (Political Contributions by Payroll Deduction). LWVC is **neutral on Proposition 38 and 39** because, while there is some merit in them, the revenues are earmarked. For more details go to <http://ca.lwv.org/action/prop1211/index.html>

LWVUS has been actively opposing restrictions to voters' ability to cast a ballot by filing briefs, joining briefs and supporting State leagues. Photo

identification will not be required for the November 6th election in Pennsylvania. A Pennsylvania court ruled that voters will not need to show a photo ID in order to vote in November. This is only a temporary injunction: the court will make a final decision after the election. Congratulations to LWVPA (Pennsylvania, not Palo Alto), the lead organizational plaintiff in the case.



This is the latest in a series of court rulings in favor of protecting voters in states where suppressive laws had been recently passed. Voter ID laws have been taken off the table in Texas and Wisconsin. In South Carolina, the U.S. Federal District Court blocked implementation of the state's new voter photo identification law for the November 6th general election, but pre-cleared the law so it will be implemented in 2013. A Federal judge ordered the Michigan Secretary of State to remove a U.S. citizenship question from ballot applications for the November 6th election, citing potential confusion and inconsistent use of the inquiry. In New Hampshire, the state's highest court blocked the use of a new voter registration form for the November 6th election. The form would likely have dissuaded college students from voting. The [New York Times](#) has a good synopsis of the cases.

LWVUS has asked local and state Leagues to encourage the media to **fact check** their ads and news articles. We have read that LWVUS members and the Annenberg Public Policy Center, University of Pennsylvania are having an impact! Kathleen Hall Jamieson of the Annenberg Public Policy Center states that TV stations in Minnesota, Iowa and South Carolina have gone beyond fact checking segments to not airing some deceptive ads.
